FROM the PASTOR

Dear Trinity Family,

In my Trumpet article this month, I would like to take some time to address some recent events that have occurred in our country; namely, the violence that has claimed several innocent lives over the course of the past couple of months. Specifically, I am referring to the attack on Annunciation Catholic School in Minneapolis that left two children dead and seventeen others wounded, and the assassination of conservative political commentator Charlie Kirk in Utah. These events have understandably shocked and grieved all of us, and I regret that I left for vacation the day after Kirk's murder, as it left me unable to respond to it in a timely manner. I knew who Charlie Kirk was and had seen some video clips of his debates with college students, but I did not realize how much of an impact he had on so many people in this country, including many members of Trinity. I also was unaware of how much his Christian faith informed his political activities until I heard what many of his supporters said about him in the days following his death. His assassination, coupled with the attack on Annunciation Catholic School, have left many conservative Christians in this country quite nervous about the future.

As Christians, we want to respond to these developments in the proper way: as Jesus would have us do, and as most glorifies Him. Here are some things that I believe Christians should be doing right now in the face of these violent episodes:

1.) First, we should pray. Pray for an end to politically motivated violence in this country. Pray for repentance for those who have engaged in it or are planning it. Pray for protection for those who may be the targets of such violence. Pray for unbelievers in this country to turn to Jesus and embrace His ways,

rather than the ways of the world. Ultimately, repentance and faith in Christ are the only way that this will actually stop.

Particularly in the weight of the Minneapolis school shooting, several politicians dismissed the power of prayer, implying that the fact that these children were shot while praying in chapel is proof that prayer doesn't "work," and that more concrete action is needed. While I certainly agree that Christians should be active in seeking concrete solutions, the dismissal of prayer as ineffectual by elected officials in our country is highly disappointing. As we all learned in our basic confirmation classes, God is not a cosmic vending machine, and we don't get everything we want from Him simply by asking Him for it. Rather, prayer is our opportunity to lay our concerns and fears before God, to remind ourselves that He is in control of all things, and to confess that only He can grant us what we need. We do not expect that He will automatically answer all of our prayers in the affirmative, but we do know that He hears us and will answer us in the proper way and at the appropriate time. Prayer helps us to realize that we are utterly dependent upon God for all good things, and that we ourselves cannot fix this situation, no matter what concrete actions we might take. Prayer changes us and our attitudes, rather than changing God's unchanging will. If we remain diligent in prayer, we will find that God will help us to trust Him more and more, and to be confident that He is indeed working to curb violence and shine the light of His Son Jesus in our land.

- **2.)** Second, we should honestly recognize that there are people in this world who wish to harm us for our beliefs. The church has always been attacked by the world, and what we are facing today is nothing new. However, it may be unfamiliar for Christians living in the United States, especially if we grew up in a time when Christianity was more respected in the public square. I've always said that it's highly unlikely that we American Christians will be martyred for our faith, and statistically, I still believe that to be true. However, it's impossible to ignore the fact that attacks on Christians have become more violent and deadly in recent years. Furthermore, the gleeful and celebratory reactions of many people online to Kirk's murder in particular shows that there are indeed plenty of people who, though they may not kill anyone themselves, certainly have no problem proclaiming that they believe their opponents deserve to die. Although I probably didn't agree with every single one of Kirk's political views, I certainly shared his faith, his basic outlook on life, and his views on issues such as abortion and sexuality, and I imagine that most people at Trinity would say the same. What this means is that there are those in this world who think that we deserve to be murdered for believing the things we do, because that's what they thought about Charlie Kirk too. That is indeed a sobering thought, but I don't know how we can pretend otherwise at this point.
- 3.) Third, we should not allow fear or intimidation to silence us or prevent us from proclaiming the Gospel of Jesus Christ. As I said above, the church has always faced hostility from the world, and it has by and large remained faithful in its witness to the truth over the past two thousand years. We need to continue in that tradition: not compromising our beliefs, and not allowing ourselves to be silenced or shouted down. Now more than ever is the time for a bold, faithful Christian witness in the public square. The forces arrayed against the church have grown violent because they are desperate, and they sense that public opinion is turning against them. Now is the time to press forward in our confession that Jesus Christ is Lord, and that God's Law is the way by which all people should live their lives, including all of his commands regarding the "controversial" issues, such as the sanctity of human life, the sanctity of marriage, and the immutability of one's biological sex. We dare not allow ourselves to be frightened into submission; the witness of the church is too important for that.
- **4.)** Fourth, we should not allow our anger at these events to drive us to unbiblical worldviews or actions. Right now, there are calls from some conservatives in this country to embrace the fact that we are in a war

with the Left, and that violence must be met with violence in order for the forces of good to succeed. Some of these voices use language that is racist, antisemitic, or otherwise out of line for Christians whose faith is based on the Scriptures. We cannot allow our understandable frustration with the current situation to drive us to seek vengeance or harm to our opponents. Young men especially need to avoid the temptation to forsake the ways of Jesus and take a more militant approach. Christians are not called to act in such ways; rather, we are called to put away our swords and fight with the Word of God. God's Word is far more powerful than any earthly weapon we could wield, and we need to have confidence that He will accomplish His purposes through it, without resorting to violence or hatred ourselves.

5.) Finally, we should never lose hope in the eternal future and salvation that God has in store for those who trust in His Son Jesus Christ. The two children in Minneapolis and Charlie Kirk are physically dead, and they will not be coming back to life before the last day. But spiritually, they are alive and well, their souls in heaven with Christ as they patiently await the resurrection of the dead. The same blessings await us after we die, regardless of whether we died of natural causes or by some violent or tragic means. This means that Christians can always look to the future with confidence and hope, because the hostility of the world against us does not change the fact that Jesus rose from the dead on the third day. He has promised that He will return at the appointed time to raise us from the dead and vindicate everyone who believed in Him, proving Himself once and for all to be the Son of God and welcoming His followers to eternal life in His kingdom. On that day, those who opposed Jesus and His people will realize that they had been gravely mistaken, and God's justice will be dispensed upon them if they never repented. We Christians, however, will just be starting our eternal lives with God, with no sin, sorrow, or pain to threaten us ever again. These promises from God give us the strength and confidence to boldly move forward and remain steadfast in our confession of faith. We may suffer in this life, but we will be vindicated on the last day. The forces of darkness in our world may seem to be winning now, but in the end, it is Jesus and His people who will win the victory and the glory.

I am reminded of Jesus' words during the Last Supper that He spoke to His disciples just a few hours before His arrest and crucifixion: "In the world you will have tribulation. But take heart; I have overcome the world" (John 16:33). We Christians do not ever need to give in to despair, because Jesus has indeed overcome the world. No matter how bleak things look in our society sometimes, Jesus remains the Lord of all creation who is returning to judge the living and the dead. We simply need to trust in Him, be patient, and await the consummation of everything His Word promises.

I would be happy to talk further about these issues with anyone who desires to do so, and I do plan on addressing them in a sermon in the near future. I also would be open to any suggestions anyone has about how to improve our safety and security at Trinity. We have made some significant changes to our security procedures over the past several years, but there are probably additional steps we could take. We also need to remember that no matter how much we prepare, there is simply no way to thwart every potential attack on our congregation. We need to have trust that God will protect us, and if He sees fit to allow an incident to happen at Trinity, then we will take comfort in the fact that no physical violence can sever our relationship with our Lord and Savior. He is faithful to His promises, and in the end, He will give us eternal life. May He bless us all with a strong and confident faith in His Son Jesus Christ, a faith that endures to the end!

So we faithfully teach the Word of God, knowing that God is at work because he has revealed to us that faith comes by hearing God's Word (Romans 10:12).

While it can be frustrating to not have the ability to measure exactly what we're trying to accomplish in our ministry, we rest in the fact that it is not we who are in control. So we have an incredible opportunity to join Jesus on his mission of making disciples, and what an exciting journey that is to witness and be a part of.

It is my encouragement to you to serve boldly, faithfully, and humbly in the church, trusting that God is working all things together for the good of those who love him and are called according to his purpose (Romans 8:28).

Bible Reading Journey - Continue your journey through the Bible in two years. Based on the reading plan in the Lutheran Study Bible from CPH, use handouts written by Rev. Dr. Todd Biermann to guide your study and home discussions. Continue to follow the reading plan on your own, and join the group for Bible Study and deeper discussion on Sundays. Join us in the gym.

Luke – In the Book of Luke, Jesus teaches us about how to live our life. Through parables, he teaches us how to treat one another and live in the world with kindness and humility. In Luke, we also learn about what Jesus holds in high regard. That he has love for the afflicted and the sinners. This class is led by Dr. Bob Quebbeman.


Stuff They Didn't Teach Me in Sunday School -- The period of the kings in ancient Israel's history was a turbulent time of formation, expansion and disappointment. Beginning with Kings Saul, David and Solomon, Israel took shape as a nation and as a people set apart by God. It's persistent disobedience in straying after foreign gods and its wanton apostasy, however, were hallmarks of its faithless ways. Chronicling these events, host Bruce Wurdeman paints the big picture of geo-politics in the region and also relays timeless stories about David, Solomon, Elijah, Elisha, Jonah, Hezekiah, the Messianic promises of the prophets and more, This is a critical period in the development of ancient Israel. Join us as we learn the "Stuff They didn't Teach Me in Sunday School about the Period of the Kings." This class is facilitated by Zeke Young.


High School Bible Study-Josh Sexton teaches our High School Students (9th-12th grade).

Faith Foundations Women's Bible Study – The Gospel of John (part 2) - The ladies of Faith Foundations will resume studying the Gospel of John. John's account of Jesus' ministry is very different from that of Matthew, Mark, and Luke: it recounts different events, includes different monologues and sayings of Jesus, and overall focuses the most on Jesus' divine identity as God in the flesh, come to dwell with His people. Countless Christians over the past two thousand years have found inspiration, joy, and hope in John's Gospel, and they will continue to do so until the day that Jesus returns in glory. Join us at Faith Foundations on Monday mornings so that you too may be encouraged by Jesus, whom John's Gospel describes as the living water, the bread of life, the light of the world, the Good Shepherd, and the resurrection and the life!

Unforgivable to Forgiven -- Forgiveness seems impossible when we are wronged. We try to deal with the hurt through coping mechanisms or by superficial statements such as, "It's fine." As we relive the past and think about the pain, we sink further into disgust towards others or ourselves. Our lives are consumed by the "unforgivable" things that we experience. Jesus offers a radically different approach. In this Bible Study, we will use Dr. Mark Rockenbach and Ted Kober's new book, "Unforgivable? How God's Forgiveness Transforms Our Lives", to explore forgiveness as the Bible defines it: a gift from God for you. Led by Vicar Oloff in the gym each Wednesday morning.

Luther's Catechism -- This class will offer an in-depth look at Luther's Catechisms on Wednesday nights. We'll learn more about the main teachings of Christian doctrine (the 10 Commandments, Creed, Lord's Prayer, and more) and discuss how to use and apply these doctrines at home in worship and devotion and in conversations throughout your daily life. This class will be especially helpful for the parents of our 3rd-8th graders as you learn more about the Catechism together. The Small Catechism was designed for individual use by pastors and laypersons alike or for use in homes for the instruction of children, while the Large Catechism was intended to assist church workers in their task of teaching the chief parts of Christian doctrine. 





Stewardship Moment

Harmonious Stewardship

"For as in one body we have many members, and the members do not all have the same function, so we, though many, are one body in Christ, and individually members one of another" (Romans 12:4-5).

One of the most forgotten concepts in stewardship is the interdependent nature that makes up the Body of Christ and the way that body supports the shared work of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. This is experienced in the local congregation, as well as in broader mission and ministry efforts at the district and Synod levels. Yet in these words, St. Paul reminds the Romans and us that we are indeed members of one another. This is true in our worship. It is also true in our stewardship of the Gospel. Stewards of all shapes and sizes, ages and abilities, affluence and influence



are all assembled around Word and Sacrament in the local congregation with no one being more important than the other. Part of this forgetting lies in what the eyes see and how our human mind operates. Our eyes and our minds are quick to come to the erroneous conclusion that the person who writes the biggest check is the more important steward. Human logic, flawed by sin as it is, could make a claim that the youngest child or the most infirm, aged member of the congregation would certainly be considered something less than important when it comes to the stewardship of the Gospel.

Paul makes it clear in these words that this is not how stewardship of the Gospel is measured in the Body of Christ. Rather, it would be better to view local stewardship like the lost art of harmony in congregational singing. This has been lost not only due to the performative nature of the lead singers of the local praise team, but also because modern hymnals are written to almost force the novice hymn-singer into unison voice. Creative harmonization by talented organists is beautiful to listen to, but does not always support the people in the pews in singing in parts. This is a loss in demonstrating a very practical aspect of whole-body stewardship.

The sound that builds when choral and congregational singers settle into their voice parts is nothing short of heavenly! Yet when altos, tenors and bass sing their individual parts without any concept of how they fit together, the music doesn't sound as powerful. The narrow range of the typical alto line almost sounds monotonous. The tenor line can get painfully high, and the base line can get uncomfortably low. But, when interdependently entwined, along with the melody that is so often carried by the sopranos, the music becomes a tremendously powerful tool in communicating the Gospel.

The same is true of individual stewards. Certainly, stewards with more financial means are in a unique place to "carry the tune" for ministry in a local congregation. But that doesn't rule out the faithful stewardship of the saint-like 94-year-old Hulda, who prayed for her young pastor in German every night while the aches and pains of arthritis and the grief of losing a daughter to cancer kept her awake. This does not rule out Jimmy, the profoundly developmentally disabled confirmand whose basic but dramatically eloquent confession of the faith left an impression on a congregation long after he went to be with Jesus. It doesn't rule out the single parent, the recovering addict, the family coming out of bankruptcy, the elderly widow and everyone in between.

The Lord has entrusted all the baptized with stewardship of the one thing needful: the Gospel of Jesus Christ. No one member of any congregation is more important than another when it comes to this stewardship. The biggest check isn't always the best way to communicate the Gospel. In fact, it is almost always better communicated with the widow's mite, the tenacious stewardship of the talents and so much more. In the local congregation and beyond, our corporate stewardship of the Gospel needs each other to fill out our great confession. It is not about equal amount. It is about interdependence that only the Holy Spirit can work! Each of us has a role to play, a harmony to sing. The standard for that role is faithfulness. We do not have the same function, but we have the same Jesus! As we sing the parts entrusted to us by the Holy Spirit, the sweet music of the Gospel goes out!






